Teutons Dislike Attitude of America
Toward European War is Belief
at Washington.

Washington, April 8.—Signs of increasing German irritation at America's attitude toward the European war is seen here. High government officials would not discuss them, but about the departments they were much commented upon. These cumulative items were named:

Major Langhorn's recall as military
attache at America's Berlin embassy.

All the American military observers
recalled from the German army.

Gifford Pinchot's exclusion of a re-
lief worker from Belgium.

The German embassy's intimation
that Thresher, the American killed
when a German submarine destroyed
the steamship Falaba, brought his fate
on himself by entering the war zone.

The embassy's open reference, in
connection with Odenwald incident at
San Juan, Porto Rico, to an American
attack on the ship.
